





COURSE PROGRAMME


Each of the five modules has been designed with an international audience in mind and will provide participants with a range of skills tailored to today's global arts industry.

All courses will be taught at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama campus, which is located in the centre of Cardiff and within walking distance of major theatres and arts venues.

Courses will typically run from 9:30am to 5:30pm each day. Throughout the course, there will be opportunities to network with UK sector experts and participants attending other courses.

By the end of the course, participants will have:

- developed new ways of thinking and working in live performance settings
- increased their technical skills and expertise in their subject of study
- experienced first-hand best practice in the UK live performance sector
- developed an international network of peers working across the sector

ARTS MANAGEMENT (ADVANCED)

Monday 10 – Friday 14 August 2015

Arts Management (Advanced) is designed for individuals that have been working in management roles within the arts and creative industries for at least 3 years and who wish to gain further experience in leadership and management in order to accelerate their career development. Participants will explore the principles of effective management and leadership, gain practical examples of how to build effective teams and work on best practice to develop audiences. Participants will receive expert tuition from course leaders with extensive arts management experience. The programme comprises visits to nearby arts venues to observe best practice and to share knowledge with industry experts.


Study topics will include:

- Building effective teams
- Leadership
- International networking and collaborations
- Audience development
- Digital strategies
- Fundraising strategies
- Strategic business planning

By the end of the course, participants will have gained a sound understanding of current arts management practice and be able to apply this to their own working contexts. We expect participants to be equipped with the core skills required for them to become confident managers and effective leaders.

Entry requirements

- Currently employed in an arts management role
- Arts experience of 3 years or more
- This course will be delivered in English, therefore a good level of English, both written and verbal, is essential (IELTS Level 6, TOEFL with a score of at least 90, or equivalent)



STAGE MANAGEMENT (ADVANCED)

Monday 10 – Friday 14 August 2015

Stage Management (Advanced) is for individuals wishing to study the roles of Deputy Stage Manager and Stage Manager in more detail. The course will provide opportunities to practise cueing for plays, musicals and operas. The programme examines the differences and commonalities between stage and event management, and the process of transferring stage management skills to other areas of the entertainment industry.

Study topics will include:

- Overview of stage management roles
- Being the Deputy Stage Manager
- Advanced prompt copies
- Working in opera and musical theatre
- Score reading
- Being the Stage Manager and Event Manager
- Advanced Health and Safety for Stage Managers

By the end of the course, participants will have consolidated their existing knowledge of stage management practice through participation in a range of practical activities and tutorials. We expect participants to be able to identify their own learning objectives from the course and understand how these can be applied within their own professional contexts.

Entry requirements

- At least one year's experience working in a stage management environment or completion of Stage Management (Intermediate) course
- This course will be delivered in English, therefore a good level of English, both written and verbal, is essential (IELTS Level 6, TOEFL with a score of at least 90, or equivalent)



TECHNICAL THEATRE: SOUND AND LIGHTING (ADVANCED)

Sunday 2 - Thursday 6 August 2015

Technical Theatre: Sound and Lighting (Advanced) is for individuals wishing to gain a deeper understanding of sound and lighting design depending on their specialism. Combining lectures and practical sessions, the course will culminate in a team-run son et lumières (sound and light show) using state-of-the-art digital equipment.

Study topics will include:

- · Health and Safety in theatre
- Introduction to theatre and concert hall systems
- Introduction to advanced lighting equipment and systems
- Introduction to advanced sound equipment and systems
- Introduction to the art of light
- · Introduction to the art of sound
- Exploration of relationship between sound and light
- Work from a brief, in groups, to produce lighting and sound designs
- Visit to local theatres

By the end of the course, participants will have gained an in-depth understanding of advanced techniques across a breadth of technical theatre disciplines, allowing them to apply their learning to their own professional contexts.

The opportunity to work on live briefs alongside international practitioners and using world-class facilities will enable confidence in participants' future lighting and sound designs.

Entry Requirements (general)

- One year's experience or more of working with relevant technical equipment, in a theatre or similar environment
- Basic understanding of analogue sound and lighting systems
- This course will be delivered in English, therefore a good level of English, both written and verbal, is essential (IELTS Level 6, TOEFL with a score of at least 90, or equivalent)
- Meet the entry criteria for Sound or Lighting

Entry Requirements (Sound)

- Understanding of the difference between Mic and Line level signals
- Understanding of controls on an analogue mixing desk, including auxiliary and group outputs
- An awareness of basic sound chain source mixer amps and speakers
- Understanding of crossovers

Entry Requirements (Lighting)

- Understanding of lighting chain, desk, dimmers and lanterns
- Understanding of Patching
- Previous use of DMX512
- Basic principles of Fresnel/PC and profile lanterns
- · Understanding of lighting rigging

ELIGIBILITY

All applicants will be required to complete an online application form, which can be found at the following link: http://www.britishcouncil.org/cultural-skills/projects/International-Theatre-Academy

The applications deadline is 17:00 GMT on Friday 22 May 2015. Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their application by Friday 29 May.

Each course will be limited to a maximum of 20 participants.

Please note that applicants who speak English as a second language may be asked to join an informal telephone interview to confirm their level of English.

Course fees cover course participation, off-site visits, learning materials, and lunches during the course.

The payment deadline for course fees is 1 July 2015.

Participants will be responsible for covering the cost of their accommodation, travel and UK visa (if applicable). Upon request, the British Council can provide a UK visa invitation letter.

Accommodation can be booked and paid for in advance through the Royal Welsh College. Facilities are self-catering and close to where courses are taught. Rooms are priced at a standard rate of £150 per person, per week.

Certification

At the end of each course, participants will be presented with a certificate of completion and recognition of learning signed by the British Council and the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama.
